Ambassador Jarring Arrives To Set Up UNMEM HQ.

Ambassador Gunnar V. Jarring, Special Representative and head of the United Nations Middle East Mission, arrived on Sunday evening in Nicosia where he will establish the headquarters for his mission.

On his arrival, he was met by Mr. B.F. Osorio-Tafall, the Secretary-General's Special Representative in Cyprus; Lt. Gen. A.E. Martola, Commander of the UN Force in Cyprus, and other UN officials in Cyprus.

On Tuesday, Ambassador Jarring left for Beirut, Lebanon, to begin a series of visits to Middle East capitals to make initial contacts with Governments in the area.

His task, as designated by the UN Security Council, is to contact Israel and her Arab neighbours to promote agreement between them and to assist in efforts to achieve a peaceful and accepted settlement of both the immediate consequences of the hostilities of last June and the longstanding disputes which have sustained tension in the area over the past 20 years.

In deciding to dispatch a UN representative to the Middle-East, the Security Council outlined the framework within which he should conduct his mission. This included withdrawal of Israeli forces from Arab Territories occupied

in June coupled with an end to all claims or states of belligerency; acknowledgement of sovereignty, territorial integrity and political independence of every State in the area — and their right to live in peace within secure and recognized boundaries, free from threats or acts of force.

The Council also affirmed the need for guarantees of freedom of navigation through international waterways, achievement of a just settlement of the 20-year-old Palestine refugee problem, and the ensuring of the inviolability and independence of every State through such measures as the establishment of demilitarized zones.

SECRETARY - GENERAL REPORTS ON UNFICYP

UN Secretary-General, U Thant, in a 66-page report to the Security Council on the last six months of operation of the United Nations Force in Cyprus, has urged all concerned to seize the opportunity emerging from the recent crisis on the island to resolve the long-standing and complex Cyprus question. To this end, he has proposed "as a first obvious step" that the Council renew for a further three to six months, the existing mandate of the UN Force, which is due to expire on 26th December.

He also envisages, should the Council wish to take necessary action, the enlargement of the mandate of the Force to include such functions as supervision of the disarmament of opposing forces and devising of "practical arrangements" to safeguard the internal security embracing the safety of all the people of Cyprus.

The Secretary-General recalls that the three appeals he made to the parties concerned during the recent crisis, included a plea to Greece and Turkey to carry out a speedy withdrawal of their forces on the island in excess of those established under international

agreement at the time of Cyprus' independence — 950 Greeks and 650 Turks, respectively. He added that such reductions could envisage the ultimate withdrawal of all non-Cypriot forces other than those of the United Nations, making possible a positive demilitarization of Cyprus.

The Secretary-General says the responses of Greece, Turkey and Cyprus to these appeals were encouraging and, he believes, provide the basis for the parties and the Security Council to consider further positive steps in the search for a durable solution.

Throughout the recent crisis, he declares, the world witnessed a chain of events that seemed to be leading inexorably to an armed conflagration. While it was possible at the eleventh hour to stem the tide, he expresses the view that it is now of "utmost urgency" to act with speed and determination to find a lasting solution. He reiterates that his good offices continue to be available to this end to the parties and to the Security Council.

It is expected that the Security Council will meet towards the end of the current week to consider the Secretary-General's report.






ONE OF BRITCON'S LONGEST SERVING MEMBERS DEPARTS





CANCON HOLD DRIVERS 'RODEO'

LT Col W.J. Newlands, Commander of Kyrenia District, has presented prize money worth more than \$50 to winners of the CANCON drivers "rodeo" and certificates to five drivers who have completed 2,500 accident-free miles in Cyprus.

The rodeo, which was sponsored by the Transport Platoon of the CANCON administrative support group at Camp Maple Leaf, was designed to test the ability of the drivers and to encourage safe driving.

The events began with obstacle driving for jeeps with trailers in which Cpl Vince Jeffers of B Company and Pte John O'Callaghan of the Transport Platoon tied. This was followed by obstacle driving for 3/4-ton trucks in which Cpl Bob Bray and Cpl Stu Avery of the Fort Garry Horse and Cpl Roy Lalonde of the Transport Platoon each scored 97 points out of 100.

Pte Jim Young of the Transport Platoon won first prize in a jeep "grand prix" — a cross-country race over natural and artificial barriers. Pte John O'Callaghan was placed second.

In the heavy vehicle section, which included Canadian 2½-ton and British three-ton trucks, Cpl Vince Jeffers took an early lead with 92 points which other drivers failed to beat. The final winner was Cpl Jack Wayman of the Transport Platoon who guided a three-tonner through the course for a near-perfect score of 95, much to the chagrin of B company.

In all, 60 drivers competed for the prize money.

Certificates for 2,500 accident-free miles of driving were presented to Pte Henry McKay, Pte Ron Stenger, Pte Jim Young, Pte John O'Callaghan and Pte Albert Hird, all of the Transport Platoon.

FINCON OBSERVES FINLAND'S 50TH INDEPENDENCE DAY

The 50th anniversary of Finland's Independence Day was observed in Cyprus with colourful ceremonies organized by the Finnish Contingent serving with the United Nations Force in Cyprus.

Festivities began with a parade of units of the 8th Finnish Battalion near HQ FINCON. The Force Commander, Lt Gen A.E. Martola, took the salute of the Battalion which was commanded by Lt Col N. Palmen. Commanding officers of the different contingents serving with UNFICYP were also present, as well as military attaches serving with diplomatic missions in Cyprus. The Force Commander and the Rev V. Muilu addressed the members forming the FINCON parade column.

Later in the day, available members of FINCON had lunch with the 1st Coy acting as hosts. During the lunch, the FINCON CO, Col Veiko Rusanen, addressed the group.

In the evening, a reception was held at the Ledra Palace with the Finnish Consul-General in Cyprus, Mr Zenon Severis, General Martola and Col Rusanen acting as co-hosts. Following the reception, officers, NCO's and other ranks attend-

ed privately-organized dinners throughout the FINCON area of responsibility.

The closing event was another reception hosted by General Martola and Col Rusanen and held in the Saray Hotel the following afternoon.

RAF EPISKOPİ TROUNCES HQ UNFICYP ELEVEN, 8-1

HQ UNFICYP spent a frustrating afternoon trying to pierce the strong defence of RAF Episkopi at RAF Nicosia on Wednesday 6 December.

RAF opened their account after ten minutes with a great goal. Four minutes later they increased their lead with a goal that was a replica of the first.

TEXT OF SECRETARY - GENERAL'S 'OBSERVATIONS'

Following is the full text of the Chapter, headed OBSERVATIONS contained in the report of the Secretary-General, U Thant, to the Security Council on the United Nations Operation in Cyprus from 13 June to 8 December 1967, which was circulated at UN Headquarters in New York on 11 December 1967, as Document S/8286:

OBSERVATIONS

The recent events in the island and their very serious repercussions have shown how precarious the situation regarding Cyprus remains and how easily and rapidly, in spite of the best efforts of UNFICYP, relatively small incidents can develop into an imminent threat to international peace.

I have already reported to the Council the three appeals which I made to the parties during the recent crisis and their replies to them, as well as the efforts of my Personal Representative, Mr Jose Rolz-Bennett. These appeals included a call to avoid all acts of force or the threats of recourse to force; a particular plea to the Governments of Greece and Turkey to take immediate measures to end any threat to the security of either one by the other as well as of Cyprus and, as a first step, to carry an expeditious withdrawal of those of their forces in excess of their respective contingents in Cyprus. I also said that such reductions, which would need to be in stages, should envisage the ultimate withdrawal from the island of all non-Cypriot armed forces, other than those of the United Nations. This would make possible the positive demilitarization of

Cyprus and would be a decisive step toward securing peace on the island. I further stated that, with regard to any further role that it might be considered desirable for UNFICYP to undertake, I gathered that this could involve, subject to the necessary action by the Security Council, enlarging the mandate of the force so as to give it broader functions in regard to the realization of quiet and peace in Cyprus, including supervision of disarmament and the devising of practical arrangements to safeguard internal security, embracing the safety of all the people of Cyprus. The response of the parties to these appeals was encouraging and does, I believe, provide a basis for the parties and the Security Council to consider the various issues involved, leading toward further positive steps in the search for a durable solution of the Cyprus question.

Throughout the recent crisis regarding Cyprus, the world lived through very anxious days, witnessing a chain of events that seemed to be leading inexorably to an armed conflagration. It was possible, at the eleventh hour, to stem the tide but it is of the utmost urgency now to act with speed

and determination in the search for a lasting solution to the Cyprus question. While the mediation effort required by the Security Council in its original resolution of March 1964 (S/RES) 186 (1964) has been inoperative for some time because of the impasse, with which the Council is well acquainted, following the submission of Mr Galo Plaza's report (S/6352), neither the parties nor the Security Council can afford to allow the situation regarding Cyprus to stumble from crisis to deeper crisis and from danger to graver danger. I wish to urge all concerned, therefore, to seize the opportunity emerging from the recent crisis and to display the statesmanship and goodwill which is essential to resolve the complex and long-standing question. I wish to reiterate that my good offices continue to be available to the parties and to the Security Council to this end.

The renewal of the mandate of UNFICYP is one obvious step for the maintenance of peace in Cyprus, and I recommend to the Council that it extend UNFICYP for another period, whether of six or of three months. What steps over and above this extension can be taken by the Council in

consultation with the parties is, of course, for the Council itself to determine.

I would conclude this report by drawing attention once again to the continuing precariousness of the situation regarding Cyprus and by expressing the hope that the parties and the Council will proceed with urgency to intensive consideration of ways and means of preventing a recurrence of conflict and of finding a basis for the settlement of the Cyprus problem.
