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UN Security Council To Meet On SW African Trials

THE 11 Member States of the UN Council for South West Africa last week unanimously decided to request the convening of an urgent meeting of the UN Security Council to take appropriate action in the case of a group of South West Africans sentenced in Pretoria last week under South Africa's "Terrorism Act".

The decision was announced to newsmen at UN Headquarters by Ambassador Agha Shahi of Pakistan, President of the Council for SW Africa, who said details of the letter of request to the President of the Security Council were being worked out. (It was expected that the Council might be convened for a meeting today, Wednesday, 14 February.)

Human Rights Commission Debates 'Apartheid' Issue

THE United Nations Human Rights Commission last week opened its debate on reports on racial discrimination in the southern part of Africa and on the treatment of prisoners and detainees in South Africa.

Mr. Petre Nedbailo of the Ukraine urged better coordination of UN efforts with the view to finding more effective means to compel the halting of the policies of apartheid.

Stating that South Africa's policies encompassed aspects of the policy of genocide, Mr. Nedbailo said the matter had ceased to be an internal affair as it involved a threat to peace.

Mr. Naseem Mirza of Pakistan described apartheid as a new form of slavery and also urged better coordination in dealing with the problem. There was no chance that the UN Security Council would take effective action, he said, because South Africa provided gold, diamonds and other minerals to the Western countries, and commerce and trade had always been regarded as more important than humanitarian values.

Mr. Felix Ermacora of Austria commended the study on apartheid in Southern Africa which the Commission is examining, and urged wider world publicity about the conditions in that part of the world.

U THANT URGES MORE LIBERAL AID TO DEVELOPING NATIONS

UN Secretary-General, U Thant, last week urged the economically advanced countries not to take too narrow a view of reciprocity in their trade relations with the less developed nations, and to regard this aid as an investment in their own future as well that of the recipients.

Addressing the UN Conference on Trade and Development in New Delhi last Friday, U Thant warned against the tendency to sacrifice long-term benefits to short-term expediency. And he expressed the hope that all developed countries would emulate those among them — "by no means the largest or the richest" — who have already assumed precise commitments to meet assistance targets set by the UN. The world Organisation has recommended that these countries devote one percent of their gross national product to development aid.

The Secretary-General also felt that the framework of UNCTAD offered special opportunities for joint approaches by by socialist and private enterprise countries to problems of development. He suggested that "the time is, perhaps, approaching when socialist participation in multilateral aid could be considered as a logical step forward from their present participation in multilateral technical assistance and a useful complement to their bilateral endeavours".

1960 - 1965 WORLD SOCIAL ADVANCEMENT "SLOW"

THE period of 1960—1965 was marked by a generally slow social advancement in the less developed countries, and a widening gap between their per capita incomes and those of economically advanced countries.

Developing lands did make an impressive progress in education and health during this period, but their gains in such areas as food production, employment and housing remained unsatisfactory.

These are among the main findings of a comprehensive UN report — made public at UN Headquarters last week — on the world social situation in the first half of the Development Decade of the 1960's.

Noting that the world's population is increasing at an unprecedented rate, the report shows that the major share of this annual increase accrues among the peoples of the economically and socially disadvantaged regions. In 1960, two out of every three persons were

living in developing regions, according to the report, and by 1980, the ratio will probably be three out of every four persons.

The report observes that birth control programs are on the increase in countries of these regions.

Regarding health conditions, the report indicates that many countries revealed a decline in their death rate during the 1960—1965 period. Progress has been made in the control of several communicable diseases such as malaria, yaws, leprosy, smallpox, polio and tuberculosis, and substantial advances have been made towards the eradication of ma-

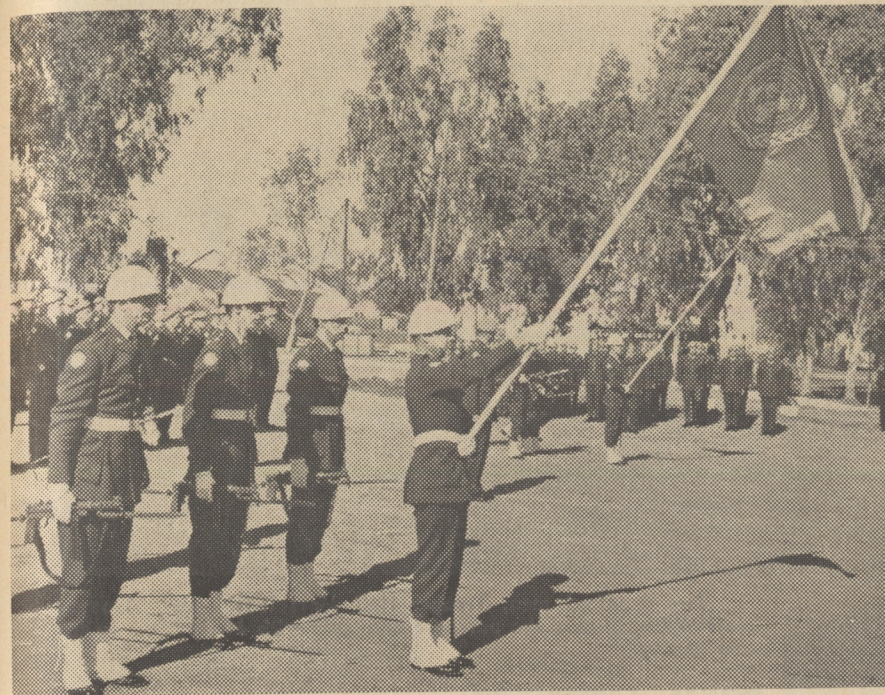

MEDALJPARADEN EN FÄRGFEST



Vår medaljparad lördagen den 3 februari blev en färgfest i blått och gult och vitt, FN:s och Sveriges färger. Från en klarblå himmel värmden den skönaste Cypernsolen på länge upp den högtidliga ceremonien på Carl Gustaf Camp, där all icke tjänstebunden personal på bataljonen stod prydligt uppsträckt i en öppen fyrkant avslutad av två av våra respekterade kp-bilar. Den engelska musikkåren ur The Royal Green Jackets exekverade finsk och svensk marschmusik med all heder och bidrog inte minst till att göra vår medaljdag till ett oförglömligt minne för var och en av oss av vår fredstjänstgöring på Cypern.

Force Commander av UNFICYP, finländske generallöjtnanten A.E. Martola, gav i sitt tal uttryck för sin erkänsla av bataljonens insatser på Cypern. General Martola medaljerade personligen zonchefen, överste Per Sune Wallin, och hans närmaste män samt även så en utvald skara om 19 män, representerande alla enheter och alla befälskategorier av den svenska FN-bataljonen.

Två fanvakter, en med FN:s färger och en med de svenska färgerna, inramade medaljhögtidligheten. Den träget förövade förbimarschen med fanvakterna i de två kp-bilarna i täten kunde inte ha avlöppt mycket bättre. Det fanns en samtidighet i marschanträdet som bataljonstabben inte ens kunnat drömma sig till i de skönsta stunder.

Efter paraden gavs lunch i officersmässen för general Martola och våra övriga gäster, den svenske konsulten på Cypern, Mr Pierides, riksdagsman James

Dickson och chefen för I 4, överste S.A. Widegren bland dem.

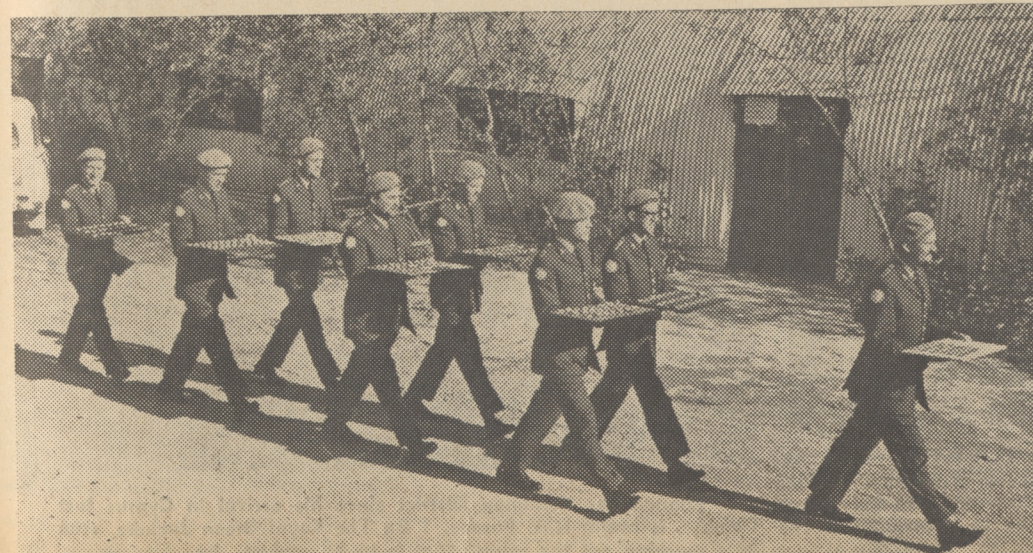
Zonchefen förste medaljören

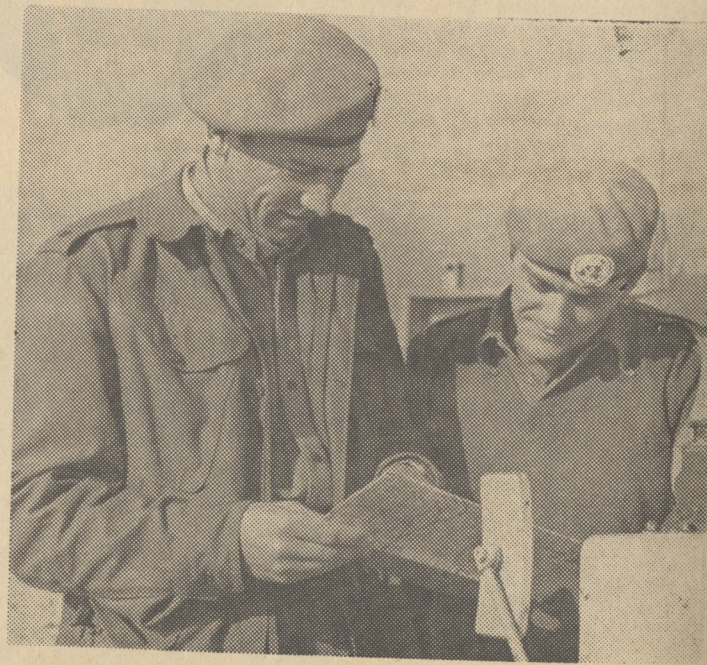
ROYAL ENGINEERS BAND ENTERTAINS

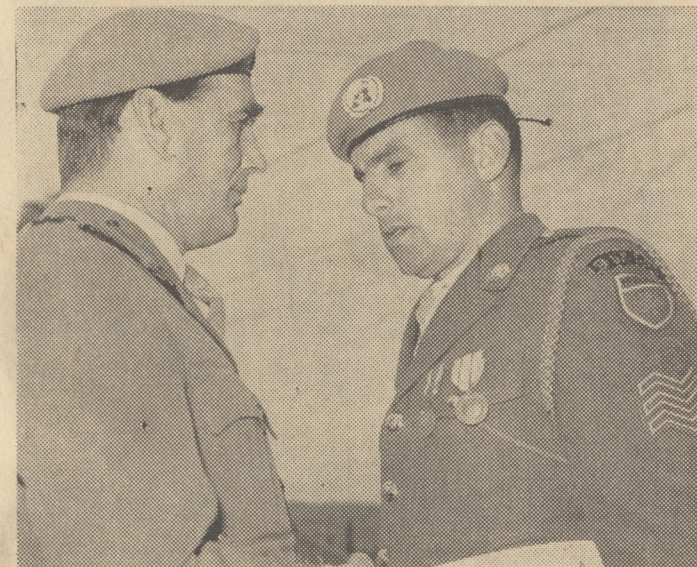
CHIEF STAFF VISIT INFANTRY GROUP

The Staff UNFICYP, Brigadier M.N. Harbottle OBE recently visited the Infantry Group stationed in the Lefka District.



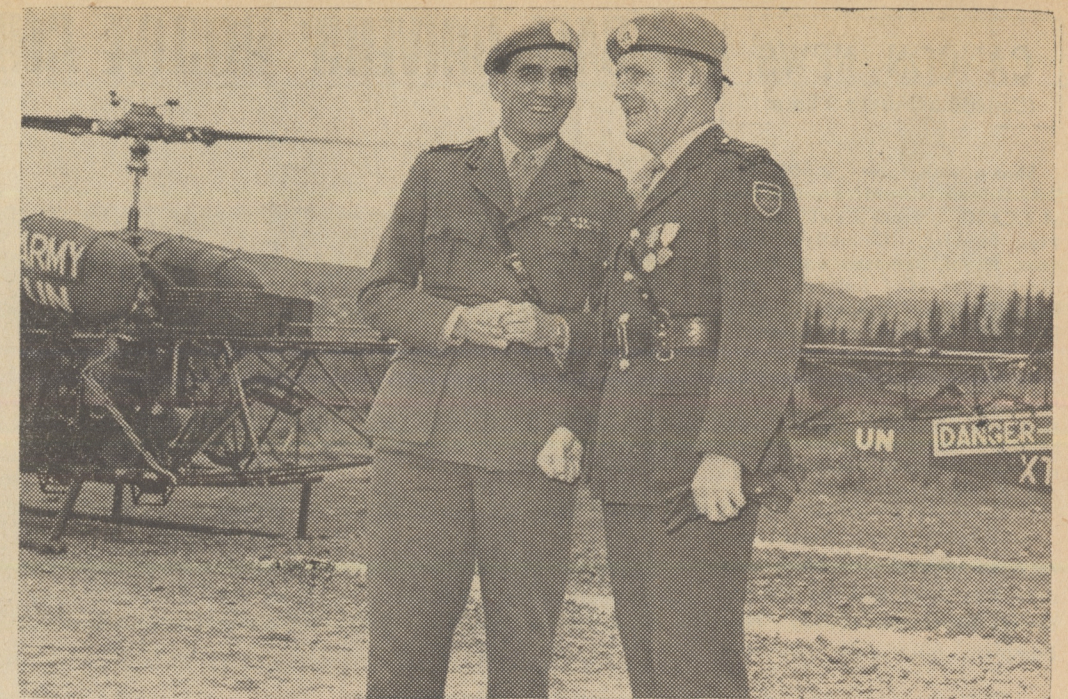
Brigadier M.N. Harbottle inspecting the Guard of Honour commanded by T. O'Connor at Xeros Camp.

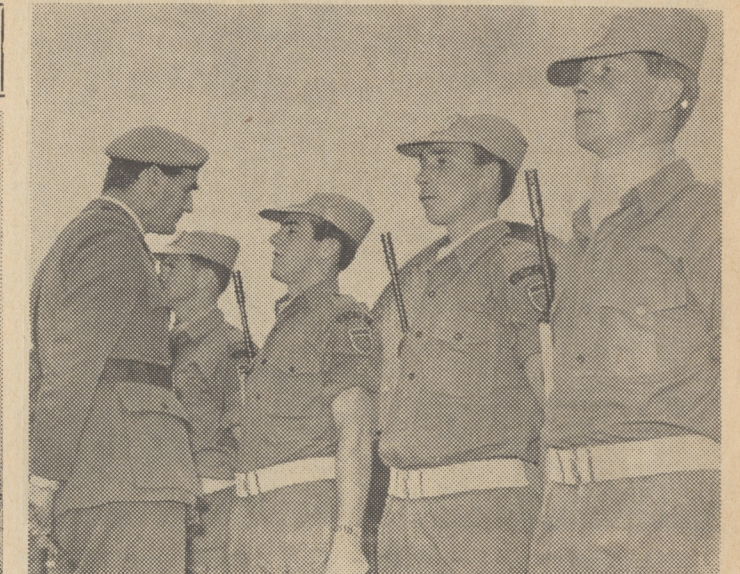

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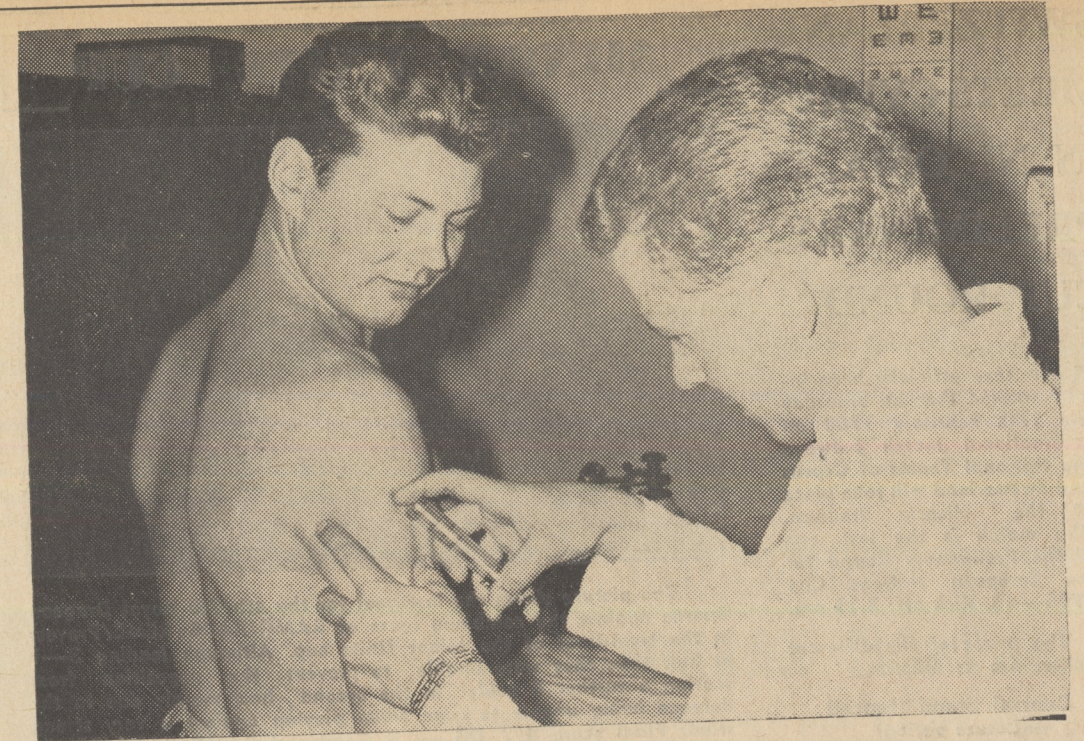

SAIRAALAMME

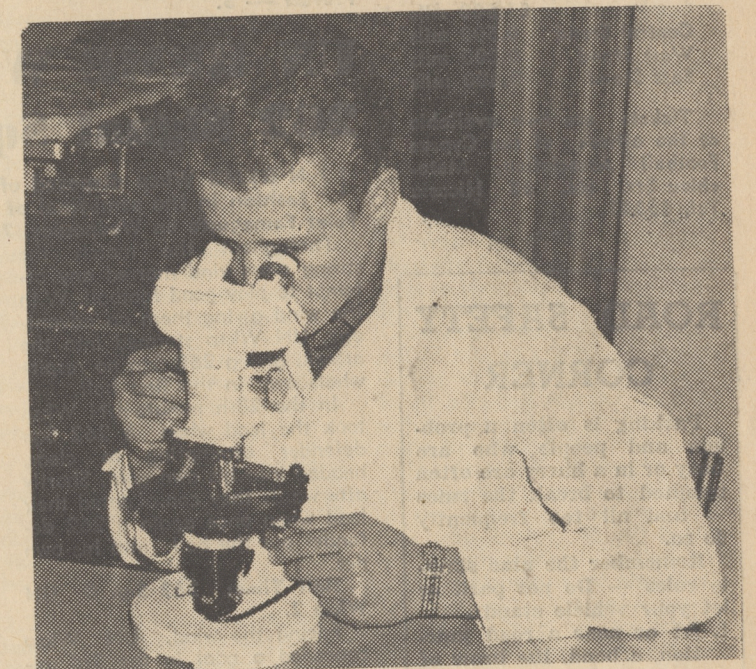
Yhdistyneitten Kansakuntien lipun vierellä hulmuava toinen lippu, jossa on valkoisella pohjalla punainen risti, ilmoittaa meille jo kauas, missä sijaitsee Suomen Pataljoonan sairaala. Tämä hieman muusta asutuksesta erillään oleva siisti talorykelmä onkin ehtinyt tulla meille kaikille tutuksi. Ne monet hyvää tarkoittavat "piikit" kun on saatu juuri omassa sairaalassamme.

Suomen Pataljoonan sairaalan henkilökunta koostuu kahdesta lääkäristä, neljästä aliupseerista, joista yksi on tulkki, ja yhdeksästä miehistöön kuuluvasta. Vanhempana lääkärinä toimii lääkintäevl D. von Flittner ja toisena lääkärinä äskettäin saarelle saapunut lääkintäevl Vuori. Tri von Flittner kertoi, että hän on olosuhteisiin katsoen varsin tyytyväinen niihin tiloihin, jotka on käytettävissä potilaita varten. Samoin koko sairaalan henkilökunnan majoitus- ja toimintatiloja hän piti erittäin tyydyttävänä. Vuodepaikkoja sairaalassa on kaikenkaikkiaan kuusi-toista kappaletta, mutta vain muutama niistä on kerrallaan käytössä, koska vaikeampia sairau-

tapauksia on verrattain vähän. Lievemmänlaatuisten veneeristen tautien lisäksi ovat yleisimpiä urheiluvammat sekä ihottuma, jota esiintyy erityisesti kesäaikaan.

Myös huonohampaisten kannattaa ensin mennä omaan sairaalaan, josta sitten tulee passitus itävaltalaiseen kenttäsairaalaan. Vaikeahkot tapaturmat, varsinkin jos ne vaativat määrättyjä kirurgisia toimenpiteitä hoidetaan myös em. kenttäsairaalassa.

Oma, yleisvaikutelmaltaan erittäin siisti sairaalamme, vaikka jouduinkin toimimaan osaksi puutteellisissa kenttäolosuhteissa, pystyy silti antamaan monipuolista apuaan useimmissa tapauksissa.

ROAD SAFETY CORNER

Parking is often a problem and people who are busy or in a hurry are often tempted to break the rules — and all too frequently do so.

Remember the nine simple rules — Do not park or let your vehicle stand:-

1. At or near a road junction, a bend, the brow of a hill or a hump-back bridge;
2. On a footpath;
3. Near traffic lights or a pedestrian crossing.
4. In a main road or one carrying fast-moving traffic;
5. Opposite or nearly opposite another standing vehicle, a refuge, or other obstruction (e.g. road repairs);
6. Alongside a standing vehicle;
7. Where there is a continuous white line;
8. At or near a bus stop, school or hospital entrance, or where it will obscure a traffic sign;
9. On the "wrong" side of the road at night.

Finally, do not inconvenience others or create traffic hazards by stopping and parking illegally.

S. AFRICA BLOCKS DECOLONIZATION EFFORTS, SG SAYS

THE Secretary-General of the United Nations, U Thant, told the UN Decolonization Committee last week that a collective determination of the United Nations to bring the story of colonialism to an end seemed to have met a solid wall of defiance in the southern part of Africa.

Touching on the problems of South West Africa, the territories under Portuguese rule and Southern Rhodesia, U Thant said that the situation in that part of the world was marked by the most conspicuous mass violation of human rights and fundamental freedoms.

The Secretary-General addressed the 24-nation committee at UN Headquarters on Thursday last as it opened its 1968 series of meetings which will range over these and other colonial problems.

Regarding South West Africa, U Thant pointed out that the Government of South Africa had repudiated the validity of the UN General Assembly resolutions terminating its mandate over the territory and setting up a UN Council to administer South West Africa until it attained independence as envisaged by next June.
