### Turkey Makes Contribution To UNFICYP Costs

IN a letter dated 31 October, the Permanent Representative of Turkey to the United Nations, Mr. Orhan Eralp, informed the Secretary-General of the United Nations that in response to the appeal contained in his letter dated 8 May, 1967, the Turkish Government had decided to make a voluntary contribution of \$283,839.24 to UNFICYP OPERATION expenses for the period of December 1966 — June 1967.

Glöm inte heller bort att varje måndag, samma tid och samma väglängd, sänds ett svenskt önskeprogram.











## UN ASSEMBLY UPHOLDS PAST VIEWS ON KOREA ISSUE

The main political committee of the United Nations General Assembly approved a resolution reaffirming the stand on Korea taken yearly by the Assembly since 1950-53 War: That the UN goal is a peaceful unification of Korea through free elections, and that a seven-nation UN Commission for Korea should continue to seek this. The resolution noted that most UN forces had been withdrawn from South Korea and that the remainder would go whenever the Republic of Korea Government requested this or whenever a settlement was reached.

the New Year's Day. They will replace Argentina, Bulgaria, Japan, Mali and Nigeria.

The Security Council is composed of five permanent members — the U.S., the Soviet Union, Britain, France and China — and ten non-permanent states chosen to give an equitable representation to the world's political map. Each year the Assembly elects five states to serve as non-permanent members of the Council. The next Assembly will have to choose replacements for Brazil, Canada, Denmark, Ethiopia and India.

## SECURITY COUNCIL CONTINUES DEBATE ON MIDDLE EAST

THE Fifteen-nation United Nations Security Council met in New York last week to resume consideration of the situation in the Middle East to which it has been attempting to find the beginning of a lasting solution ever since the ceasefire was achieved between Israel and her Arab neighbours last June. The request for a renewed consideration of the problem by the Council was made by the United Arab Republic in a letter addressed to the President of the Security Council, Mr. Mamadou Kante of Mali, earlier last week. The UAR Delegate to the United Nations argued that an urgent session of the Council was made necessary by a "dangerous situation" resulting from Israel's persistent refusal to withdraw from the Arab territories it had occupied consequent upon the recent conflict.

For several weeks the Council Members had been holding private consultations which had failed to produce an agreed formula on steps to be taken to achieve a lasting settlement.

Two draft resolutions have been submitted for the Council's consideration. India and Nigeria have proposed that the Secretary-General dispatch a special representative to the area to contact the States concerned and "coordinate efforts" to achieve a settlement in line

with the series of governing principles set out in their draft. The United States also submitted a draft resolution which would have the Secretary-General designate a special representative to contact the parties concerned. The two drafts differed, however, in the manner in which they spelled out the mandate to be given to the Secretary-General's representative and in the emphasis they gave to the principles which should govern an ultimate settlement.
