
General Martola arrived from New York, via Athens, after a series of consultations with Secretary-General, U Thant, and other high UN officials at United Nations Headquarters in New York.

'PLEASED' AND 'ENCOURAGED' BY TALKS ON CYPRUS PROBLEM

Mr. Carlos A. Bernardes, Special Representative of the Secretary-General in Cyprus, returned to Nicosia on Sunday evening, 15 May, accompanied by Dr. Remy George, UNFICYP Senior Legal/Political Adviser, after visiting Ankara and Athens where he discussed with the Turkish and Greek Governments matters pertaining to the Cyprus question.

Mr. Bernardes was met at the airport by representatives of the Cyprus Government, Brigadier A.J. Wilson, UNFICYP Chief of Staff who has acted as Commander of UNFICYP since the death of Gen. K.S. Thimayya, other UNFICYP officials, and representatives of the foreign di-

plomatic corps in Cyprus.

Speaking to reporters at the airport, Mr. Bernardes recalled that six weeks ago the Secretary-General broadened his responsibilities, including in his mandate the task of seeking inside and outside the Island, ways and means in which the United Nations could be of assistance to the parties in finding an answer to the difficulties which still confront Cyprus. It was to discharge this new responsibility that he undertook his trip, he said.

Mr. Bernardes said that he had met with UN Secretary-General, U Thant, in Paris and Geneva where they had,

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ACCIDENT FIGURES UP AGAIN

Force accident figures — down for the month of March to the lowest figure on record — rose again during April according to figures just made available by the UNFICYP Military Police.

The previous month's total of twenty-three accidents had been the lowest ever recorded in the Force, but April's figures, with the British Contingent leading the way, were five up on this. British Contingent vehicles accounted for sixteen of the total number of accidents — fifty seven per cent — at an average of seventeen thousand, two hundred miles per accident.

CANCON again showed a reduction in their accident figures, but pride of place went to the Irish Contingent, who completed nearly ninety thousand miles without a single accident.

JORDAN ACCUSED BY ISRAEL

TWO KILLED IN BORDER INCIDENT

ISRAEL, in a letter to the Security Council this week, charged that Jordanian fire had killed two persons and wounded three belonging to an Israeli work party repairing a track north of Be'er Sheba on Tuesday of last week.

Ambassador Michael Comay said in the letter that this Government had given advance notification of the work through U.N. channels, and

U THANT REITERATES LONG-STANDING VIEW:

NO INVOLVEMENT IN VIET-NAM WAR

MAJORITY OF MEMBERS AGAINST ANY UN PEACE-KEEPING OPERATION AT THIS TIME

UN Secretary-General, U Thant, last week maintained his long-standing position that the United Nations could not and should not be involved in any peace-keeping operation in Viet-Nam at this time. This reflected the view of more than two of the big Powers, as well as the vast majority of United Nations Members large and small.

Everyone knew, he said, that the Soviet Union and France were opposed to any U.N. involvement in the conflict in Viet-Nam, and he had good reason to know that Britain was also very reluctant to get the U.N. involved.

The Secretary-General said it was obvious that the United Nations could only be as effective as its members — particularly the big Powers — wished to make it. To illustrate this point, he referred specifically to two current peace-keeping problems before the world Organization — Cyprus and the Dominican Republic.

In the case of Cyprus, he said, the big Powers involved had "quite rightly" attempted to avert open conflict. They failed. Subsequently NATO, "quite justifi-

ably", attempted to find a solution. It failed. The issue was brought to the United Nations and, because the major Powers were agreed, the U.N. had for the past two years been able to prevent an "unthinkable" situation which would have developed on the Island had it not been for U.N. intervention.

On the other hand, U Thant pointed out, the United Nations had not been able to fulfil an equivalent role in the Dominican Republic because one of the major Powers — the United States — had not wanted it to be involved.

Reverting to the situation in Viet-Nam, the Secretary-General said that although the United Nations, in view of lack of agreement among the great Powers, seemed to be left impotent in the face of the most serious international crisis since World War II, he had in his private capacity been exerting and would continue to exert effort to bring about a just, equitable and peaceful solution. Many of his initiatives had necessarily not been made public, he said, but he hoped to be able to disclose, at the proper time, some of the steps he had taken and some of the reasons why they had not so far been successful.

The Secretary-General made these comments at United Nations Headquarters in New York last Thursday in an address before the annual conference of non-governmental organisations associated with the United Nations.

SECURITY COUNCIL MEETS ON RHODESIA:

NEW AFRICAN DRAFT IS CONSIDERED

Following a request by thirty-one African States, the U.N. Security Council was scheduled to meet yesterday, Tuesday, 17 May, to give renewed consideration to the problem of Rhodesia.

An African draft resolution would have the Council call upon Great Britain to impose an armed blockade against Rhodesia and use force if needed to bring down the rebellious white minority regime headed by Mr. Ian Smith.

It would also request all States — and specifically South Africa and Portugal — to cut off economic relations with Rhodesia in accordance with past U.N. decisions, and in particular not to supply it with oil.

res, it declares, have failed to topple the "racist regime" in Salisbury.

The draft criticizes Great Britain for negotiating with envoys from Salisbury without the participation of genuine representatives of the Zimbabwe people.

This reference is to the recent London talks which, according to the draft resolution, could seriously prejudice the people's exercise of their rights to freedom and independence. Britain, the draft says, should hold consultations with leaders of the African political parties on how to set up a government meeting the people's aspirations and based on universal suffrage.

Despite this and earlier Council decisions, the draft says, the economic embargo against Rhodesia is not universally observed, as substantial oil supplies are still coming in. Economic meas-

PEACE-KEEPING OPERATIONS UNDER REVIEW

THE general problems of United Nations peace-keeping operations and their financing came under renewed consideration last week in the Special Thirty-third Session Committee of the General Assembly.

Urging a pragmatic approach, the Swedish Ambassador, Mr. Sverker Astrom, suggested three steps which he said could strengthen the U.N.'s peace-keeping ability to a limited but valuable degree:

• A joint declaration whereby Member States would reaffirm their intent to make full use of the United Nations for the maintenance of peace;

• Working out a special scale of assessments to be applied to peace-keeping operations when there was general agreement that a given undertaking should

FURTHER \$100,000 JAPANESE CONTRIBUTION TO UNFICYP

Japan will make a further contribution towards the costs of the United Nations Peace-Keeping Force in Cyprus. In a letter to the United Nations Secretary-General the Permanent Representative of Japan to the United Nations, Ambassador Akira Matsui, said that his country would voluntarily contribute a further \$100 thousand towards the costs of UNFICYP "without prejudice to its stand on problems concerning United Nations peace-keeping operations".

be paid for collectively by the U.N. membership; and,

• A further study of standby arrangements, national and international, to enable the U.N. to act swiftly and effectively to keep the peace.


The Swedish Ambassador thought certain controversial issues such as the relative authority of the Security Council and the General Assembly in undertaking peace-keeping operations should be set aside for the time being.

Ambassador Paul Tremblay of Canada, speaking before the Committee, stressed the importance of associating peace-keeping with peaceful settlement.

In principle, his delegation believed that no peace-keeping operation should be authorized unless recommendations were made regarding peaceful settlement as well.

The Canadian representative stressed that a greater use of peaceful means of settling disputes would help reduce the duration of peace-keeping operations and could even affect their character, perhaps enabling the United Nations to dispatch observers — instead of military forces — to a trouble spot.

NEW COMMANDER FOR AIR OP TROOP

4TH Air Observation Troop, Royal Artillery are already well known throughout the UN Peace Keeping Force in Cyprus for their support of all contingents. The Troop, now commanded by Major J.M. (John) Heath, RA, who arrived in Cyprus last Wednesday, took over from 21 Flight, Army Air Corps, commanded by Major John Coles in February this year.

In their role of Force Army Helicopter Flight the Troop's main tasks are liaison, reconnaissance and communications flying. Equipped with Sioux helicopters and Auster light aircraft the Troop is capable of providing flights at short notice to all

parts of the island seven days a week.


Flying the Sioux helicopters are Major John Heath himself, Captain Vincent Edwards, RA, who commanded the Troop after the unfortunate loss of Major Ewart Pavay on 7th April, Captain Rod Canning, RA, Captain Nigel Burch, RA and Sgt Dave Blackburn of the 4/7th Dragoon Guards. The machines are made by Westland Aircraft Company under licence. They have a cruising speed of 80 mph and a range of some 200 miles.

The Austers, a type well known for their service over the past 30 years, have been flown for some time past by Captain Mike Sumner, DLI and Captain Eric Butler, LAN R. Both have been with the Force for quite some time having served here with 21 Flt. Mike Sumner acts as Flight Adjutant in addition to his flying duties; Eric Butler has just returned to the UK. The Mk IX's in service with 4th Troop were first produced some ten years ago. Their ability to operate from short rough strips makes them ideal for use on the daily 'milk run' around the Island carrying mail to all parts of the force. Cruising speed is 90 mph and range 280 miles.

Working with the Troop at present is Major Perce Davis, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, who is on attachment to the British Army and normally works with the Troop's parent HQ in the UK. Major Davis is a highly qualified instructor who visits Cyprus and other countries abroad from time to time to carry out periodic pilot checks, he also assists in normal flying duties on both the helicopters and fixed wing aircraft.


Maintaining the aircraft and keeping them serviceable are a ground crew of 5 NCOs and men of the REME under the Troop Staff Sgt Pip Beard, REME, and a detachment of 12 NCOs and men from 71 Aircraft Workshop REME, at present attached to the Troop under WO I Jock Leishman, an ex Royal Navy Petty Officer. This detachment includes a Stores Section and Photography Section both of which are RAOC.

Completing this up to date and very operational unit which does so much for the Force are Sgt Paddy McBride, the Troop G.D. Sergeant and his 9 NCOs and men.





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nister of Interior, other Cyprus Government officials, Mr. Carlos A. Bernardes, Special Representative of the Secretary-General in Cyprus, Brigadier A.J. Wilson, UNFICYP Chief of Staff who had been acting in Command of UNFICYP following the death in December last of General Thimayya, other UNFICYP officials, and members of the foreign diplomatic corps in Cyprus.

Speaking briefly with press representatives at the Nicosia airport, General Martola said he was glad to be in Cyprus and was proud of the confidence which U.N. Secretary-General, U Thant, had placed in him.

Yesterday, Tuesday, the Commander arrived at UNFICYP Headquarters at 0930 hours and inspected a composite Guard of Honour outside the Chief of Staff's office. After inspecting the Guard, he was introduced to all Contingent Commanders and senior officers serving at Headquarters.

Immediately after, the Commander attended a military briefing set up for him at Headquarters and later conferred with Mr. Bernardes and senior United Nations officials attached to the Force.

General Martola is expected today to make an initial courtesy visit to Archbishop Makarios, President of the Republic of Cyprus, and later call on Dr. Fazil Küçük, Vice-President.

Starting on Thursday, the Commander is scheduled to make brief visits to each of the contingents in the UNFICYP zones where they are deployed.
