FIRST GREENJACKETS ARRIVE

At 2220 hrs on Friday 20th October, the advance party of 104 officers and men of the 1st Bn The Royal Greenjackets arrived at Akrotiri to commence taking over from the "Dukes" who are now at the end of their UN tour.

The advance party, under Major WSC Chevis dispersed to outposts in the Limassol Zone on Saturday 21st Oct in preparation for the arrival of the main body who are due to arrive between the 1st and 4th November 1967.

S-G CONGRATULATES SOVIET UNION ON VENUS FEAT

The United Nations Secretary-General, U Thant, last week sent a message of congratulations to Mr A. N. Kosygin, Chairman of the Council of Ministers of the USSR, on the landing his country achieved in Venus.

In his message, the Secretary-General described the landing as a "magnificent achievement" in the exploration of outer space, "yet another great accomplishment in the series of the achievements which were initiated by the USSR 10 years ago in the exploration of outer space".

U Thant said he hoped that "this and other achievements will contribute to the cause of international co-operation in the peaceful exploration of outer space".

GENERAL ASSEMBLY

UN Committees Debate

South Africa, Rhodesia Issues

Issues involving Africa were among those being actively considered in the committees of the UN General Assembly now meeting in New York for its annual session attended by all 122 Member States of the U.N.

The Special Political Committee took up a report urging the Security Council to be asked to tighten an arms embargo against South Africa and to decree economic and other measures to force the Pretoria Government to change its racial policies.

A draft resolution on the Rhodesian question was being awaited last week in the Committee on Non-Self-Governing Territories. It was expected to reflect two major themes that dominated the date on how to topple the white minority regime of Mr Ian Smith and to secure a majority rule in Rho-

MIDDLE EAST SITUATION WEIGHED AT UN HQs.

The UN General Assembly — currently in session at UN Headquarters in New York — was in recess last week and early this week as intensive consultations were in progress regarding the next steps to be taken by the United Nations in the Middle East situation.

Ambassador Sengin Tsuruoka of Japan, current president of the UN Security Council, called in the 10 non-permanent members of the Council for an informal exchange of views on Tuesday and Thursday of last week following consultations with the parties to the Middle East conflict, the permanent members of the Council (China, France, the U.S.S.R., the United Kingdom, and the United States), and some other members of the Assembly. Mr Tsuruoka said the exchanges had been exploratory: no specific draft resolutions had been discussed, and the non-permanent members of the Council will meet again this week.

Declining to express either optimism or pessimism as to the outcome of the talks, he added that it was still the consensus that there would be no point in calling a meeting of the Security Council until a positive outcome could be reasonably assured.

DESTROYER SINKING BRINGS ISRAEL, U.A.R. CHARGES

THE sinking of an Israeli destroyer over the past week-end brought charges and counter-charges from Israel and the United Arab Republic.

In a letter to the UN Security Council, Israel complained of a "wanton act of aggression" committed by the United Arab Republic which resulted in 15 dead, 36 missing and 48 wounded. Israel said its vessel, the "Eliat", had been on a routine patrol on the high seas when it was attacked by surface-to-surface UAR missiles.

The UAR charged that the Israeli destroyer had engaged in "aggressive" action in UAR territorial waters of Port Said. UAR naval units had been forced to act in self-defence and, in the ensuing firing, the Israeli vessel had been sunk, the United Arab Republic said.


General Odd Bull, Chief UN Truce Supervisor, reported to the UN that as yet he had no verified information about the nature of the attack on the destroyer.

Finland, Sweden Contribute to UNFICYP Costs

Finland and Sweden, two countries which are participating with contingents serving with the United Nations Force in Cyprus, have made further voluntary contributions to provide financial support to UNFICYP operations in Cyprus.

In a letter dated 12 October addressed to the Secretary-General, U Thant, sent by the Per-



One of his few defeats as an amateur was at the hands of Carl Mildener of West Germany on points, who later achieved fame as a Professional Heavyweight.







Svenske FN-representanten, ambassadör Sverker Åström, skrev i sitt brev den 16/10 till generalsekreteraren, att "den svenska regeringen beslutat bidra med 180.000 US dollar för att möta UNFICYP-kostnaderna för den löpande mandattiden".

Finland har beslutat ge ett nytt bidrag med 50.000 US dollar.







Assembly Upholds Equal Rights For Women

A declaration aimed at eliminating discrimination against women was unanimously adopted last week by the Social Committee of the UN General Assembly now meeting in New York.

The Declaration climaxed several years of UN work on this document and was described by the Committee Chairman, Mrs Mara Radic of Yugoslavia, as one of the most important actions taken by the world Organization.

The preamble of the Declaration states that discrimination still existing against women is incompatible with human dignity and with the welfare of family and society. Equal rights, it says, must be applied in all fields, including acquisition and control of property, and especially in the marriage choice of spouse, a say in the rearing of children of marriage, and the right to divorce.

UNITED NATIONS DAY

U THANT URGES REASSESSMENT OF WORLD VALUES TODAY

Every year, on 24 October, nations all over the world observe UNITED NATIONS DAY — the date on which the United Nations Charter came into effect in 1945.

On this occasion, UN Secretary-General, U Thant, issued the following message:

When the Charter of the United Nations was written twenty-two years ago, those who signed it in the name of the peoples of the world proclaimed one overriding objective: to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war and to build a world of social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom for all.

For the attainment of this goal, they prescribed standards of conduct which may be summarized in these few words: good neighbourliness, tolerance and the acceptance of lawful procedures in international life.

As we look at the world around us today, we cannot but recognize that the promises of the Charter, in the field of economic and social advancement as much as in the field of international political relationships, are far from fulfilled. Two decades after the nations of the world agreed "to employ international measures for the promotion of economic and social advancement of all peoples", hunger, poverty and disease still haunt more than two-thirds of mankind, and the gap between the rich and the poor is widening to the point of despair. At the same time, two decades after pledging "that armed forces shall not be used, save in the common interest", nations have not only been unable to abandon war as a means of protecting or promoting self-interest but, ominously, they seem, at times, to be on the brink of abandoning their faith in the Charter and in the validity or practicability of the world envisaged by it.

For this sorrowful and potentially disastrous state of affairs in the world of today, perhaps the chief factor responsible is what might be described as a state of mind or, rather, a state of morality. As the nations of the world have accumulated, over the past two decades since the Charter was proclaimed, greater and greater potential for good as well as for evil, they have



not acquired the corresponding sense of obligation towards others. It is this moral imbalance which is both responsible for, and is itself fed by, the "implementation-gap" between the promises proclaimed in the Charter and the actual practices of nations, large and small.

This Anniversary Day provides an opportunity for a stock-taking, both material and moral. It provides an opportunity for recalling the principles proclaimed twenty-two years ago and for reassessing their value in the world today. The way of life enjoined by the Charter is no mere philosophical dream. Ideals, in the long run, have always turned out to be mankind's most practical and precious possessions. In a world bristling with means of massive destruction, such ideals have now become the only alternative to self-extinction.

Let us, therefore, on this day reaffirm the wisdom of the way of life proclaimed in the United Nations Charter and determine to renew our efforts towards attaining it.

Using the long ball down the middle to good effect, 1 York & Lancs scored at frequent intervals. Only brilliant goalkeeping by HQ's goalkeeper Bracey kept the score down to 4 — 0 at half-time.

In the second half, 1 York & Lancs piled on the pressure, using the open spaces intelligently and harassing HQ's defence into making defensive errors. Again it was the sterling work of goalkeeper Bracey which foiled 1 York & Lancs reaching double figures.

Permanent Representative of Finland to the United Nations, Mr Max Jakobson, the letter informed the U.N. that his country had decided to make a further contribution of 50,000 dollars to help the United Nations meet the cost of UNFICYP. This contribution he said, should "in due course" be offset against expenses paid by the Finnish Government in connection with the Finnish contingent to UNFICYP.

In a letter dated 16 October addressed to the Secretary-General, the Permanent Representative of Sweden to the UN, Mr Sverker Astrom, said that Sweden had decided to make a contribution of 180,000 dollars towards meeting the costs of UNFICYP for the period June-December, 1967. In making this contribution, the Swedish Government said it had taken this decision "without prejudice to its stand on the principle of collective financial responsibility for United Nations operations of this nature".
