Assembly Hears Speakers Urge Council to Act On S-W Africa

Further denunciation of South Africa for her refusal to yield South West Africa to UN administration and then swift independence was heard in the UN General Assembly last week as most African-Asian, Eastern Europe and Latin American speakers took the floor to urge strong action by the UN Security Council to get South Africa out of the Territory.

Some States blamed South Africa's major trading partners for making it possible for her to continue her defiance of the United Nations.

The United States said it had tried its utmost by peaceful means to get South Africa to heed UN decisions, and that it was not averse to enlisting the support of the Security Council, but that the UN Assembly should not seek to prejudge what action the Council might take.

Meanwhile, the special UN Committee on Decolonization last week asked Great Britain to ensure that all land alienated from the indigenous inhabitants of Swaziland is return to them or that they are compensated. The Committee also asked Britain to do everything possible to bring about the economic independence of Swaziland vis-a-vis South Africa and to protect its sovereignty.


U Thant Calls on Africa To Heed U. N. Decisions

UN Secretary-General, U Thant, said on Monday that if the United Nations were to progress in its tasks of aiding Africa to rid herself of colonialism, all States must accept international decisions and machinery, and realise that the wider interests of international peace might also coincide with their own best interests.

Austria, Jamaica Contribute To UNFICYP Costs

Austria and Jamaica are making additional voluntary contributions to help offset the cost of the United Nations Force in Cyprus.

In a letter, dated 10 May, to the Secretary-General, U Thant, the Government of Austria informed the United Nations (Continued on p. 8)

INTER-DENOMINATIONAL SERVICE TO BE HELD MONDAY AT SALAMIS

Last Monday, a meeting of contingent Chaplains under the chairmanship of Major Jim Boyles of Personnel Branch, was held at Salamis.

The meeting was to finalise arrangements for the inter-denominational service to be held at Salamis on Whitsun Monday, 3

June, at 1900 hours. The site has been made available by kind permission of the Director—General of the Ministry of Communication and Works.

The band of the 1st Battalion, The Durham Light Infantry will render accompaniment during what is expected to be a most impressive service.

Haiti Denounces Attempts To Overthrow Its Regime

The 15-nation UN Security Council — meeting at UN Headquarters in New York on Monday — heard Haiti charge that exiles operating from the United States and elsewhere organised ground and air attacks against her last week in an attempt to bring down the Government of President Duvalier.

Declaring that these were international acts of "brigandage" which sought to destroy the democratic institutions of the world's first black republic, Ambassador Bonhomme said that international peace was at stake. He said that the Government of Haiti demanded an immediate cessation of such acts, punishment of those who used the territory of certain countries to prepare

In a statement on the observance of Africa Day at UN Headquarters in New York, U Thant said that the problems affecting southern Africa were in a class by themselves in constituting "the most conspicuous mass violation of human rights and freedoms."

One reason, he said why the United Nations had been unable to provide effective solutions to these problems was the non-compliance by Powers directly concerned with UN resolutions and the reluctance of some others to cooperate fully with the world Organisation.

Soviet, U. S. Again Urge Support For Non - A Pact

In the Main Political Committee of the 124-nation UN General Assembly — currently meeting at UN Headquarters in New York — the Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister, Mr V. Kuznetsov, took the floor again last week to urge that the proposed US-Soviet draft Treaty against the spread of nuclear weapons be put into effect as soon as possible.

Emphasizing that this would strengthen world peace, make States more secure, and help their economics, Mr Kuznetsov once again joined with the United States in urging a speedy endorsement of the proposed pact.

Canada and Ireland also reiterated their calls for approval of the Treaty, and Jordan, Laos and Ecuador expressed their support.

South Africa and Algeria told the Committee they could not support the draft in its present form, and reservations and suggested changes were put forward by Argentina, Romania, Guyana, Zambia and Sierra Leone. The last two States urged that action be postponed until the next Assembly session in September.

Ambassador Arthur Goldberg of the United States told the Council that the US had always thoroughly investigated all indications of any activity on its soil against Haiti and that it had taken action under its laws in every case to punish any violation found.

HVEM VAR AFRODITE?

Hver eneste spraglet turistbrochure for Cypern tager Afrodite til indtægt. Men hvem var hun egentlig? - og hvad har hun med Cypern at gøre? Brochurerne besvarer ikke spørgsmålene, og rejsehåndbøgerne giver ofte flere vild- end vejledende oplysninger. Vor historiske medarbejder har imidlertid undersøgt problemerne grundigt, og i det følgende redes de spegede tråde ud.

Afrodite er mytologiens kærlighedsgudinde. Hun var, ifølge Homer, datter af gudernes konge Zeus og gudinden Dion.

Kører man ad kystvejen fra Limassol mod Ktima, skal man stansse op der hvor et par vældige klipper ligger i havstokken. Her siger



blev forelskede, men skæbnen ville, at Adonis blev dræbt under en jagt. Afrodite græd over at have mistet sin elskede, men hvor hendes tårer flød sammen med blodet fra Adonis' sår, der spredte de skønneste røde og hvide anemoner frem.

Det Paphos, der her er tale om, er gamle Paphos ved landsbyen Kouklia tæt nord for kystvejen, og her finder vi ruinerne af Afrodites hovedtempel. Det hævdes at gudinden alene i Paphos havde over hundrede andre. Her var også et orakel, og her havde hendes yppersætpræst sit sede.

Forskerne er fortsat uenige om, i hvor høj grad Afrodite-dyrkelsen er inspireret af den fænøske kult for frugtbarhedsgudinden Astarte, og man tør ikke med bestemthed fastslå, hvornår det hele begyndte. Imidlertid ser det ud som om statuer af gudinden først omkring år 800 vor tidssregnings begyndelse afslører de kegleformede sejler, der indtil da havde stået i templernes midte.

I gudsdyrkelsen indgik dyreofringer, og blandt de foretrukne dyr var svin, måske fordi det var et vildsvin, der dræbte Adonis. De store Afrodite fester holdtes om foråret og tiltrak sig gæster, ikke alene fra hele Cypern, men også fra fastlandet. Festerne varede tre dage. Templer og andre var blomster-smykkede. Der var processioner gennem blomstrende haver, og der var musik og dans.

Medens gudsdyrkelsen i begyndelsen havde et alvorligt præg, udviklede navnlige festerne sig med tiden til vilde sex-orgier.

Nu er det meste af området udgravet af arkæologerne, der skal lidt fantasi til at forestille sig hvordan det hele engang har været, men hvem har ikke det? Og skulle nogen ønske at se den skumføde, ja så behøver de ikke ulejlige dem til Paphos, for Cyperns museum her i Nicosia har en nydelig statue af hendes hovede.

En dag mødte Afrodite helten Adonis i en dal ved Paphos. De



När Blue Berets utsände medarbetare åtföljd av två stycken amatörfotografer anlände till platsen syntes endast kraftiga hjulspår, vilket tydde på att lastbilar besökt den svårtillgängliga bergstoppen. Munkarna i det på platsen belägna klostret upplyste älskvärt BB:s utsände, att mängder av soldater av okänd nationalitet mycket tidigt på morgonen hade stormat toppen. Detta skulle ha inträffat någon gång mellan kl 6,00 och 6,30 - alltså tre å fyra timmar tidigare än beräknat. De hade sedan hämtats av lastfordonen.


Security for the party is provided by Coy-Sgt Dunne (left) and Pte "40" O'Brien — and who better to keep watch and ward than these two noted marksmen.

TEAM WORK







POSTILANTIKAN MUKANA

Kansaa nojailemassa Nicosian uuden lentoaseman pitkän ulkoilmatarvekseen kaiteeseen. British European Airwaysin Comet 4 B on jo aikojen sitten irroittanut laskutelineet, se on enää sadan metrin korkeudessa, peittää hetkeksi laskevan auringon näkyvistään, kuluu minuutin puolikas, ja pyörät koskettavat kiitorataa. Vinkkuun, suhisten ja kohisten kone rullaa hetken kuluttua pisteeseen 3. Ovet ja luukut alkavat aukiolla, mm. keskivaiheilla pohjassa oleva luukku. Säkkejä alkaa tipahdella kiivaassa tähdissä odottavien vaunuuihin. Siellä joukossa myös aamulla Suomesta lähtenyt postisäkki.

Vaunut ajetaan yhteen pitkää sisurakennuksessa olevista toimistosta, eikä muuta enää tarvata. Siinä ne jo ovatkin suomalaisen postilandroverin miehistön käsien ulottuvilla. Pojat eivät siekkaile eivätkä aikale, oikea säkki löytyy pian, se nykäistään autoon ja lähdetään ajamaan kohti Finlandiaa.

From CANADA to CYPRUS

"A LITTLE BIT OF HOME"

Since the Canadian contingent came to Cyprus in March, 1964, a very special relationship has developed between Canada and Kostas Kollis, Custodian of the Abbey at Bellapais. Beautiful place, the name means, and if possible, the crumbling 13th Century ruins of the Abbey are even more beautiful to United Nations wearers of the Canadian Maple Leaf because around them is a little bit of home.

Since 1964 Kostas has been deluged with garden seeds from Canada. Startling things happen to the hardy Canadian seeds in the balmy climate of Bellapais. Zinias, which might grow four feet tall with expert coaching in Canada, commonly hit six or seven feet with sunflower-like blooms in Bellapais soil. Canadian sunflower seeds in Bellapais emulated Jack's famous beanstalk.

Last year Kostas established something of a record for speed

The walls sport souvenirs from Edmonton, Calgary, Montreal, Toronto, Quebec City, Sorel, and Halifax. Each contingent adds to his collection of regimental badges and mementos from as far as 10,000 miles away.

The trading friendship has been far from a one-way street. Several Canadians have taken home ancient Cypriot goat bells to tinkle in their living rooms at home and Kostas is liberal with his skill at designing Cypriot patterns on dried gourds.

He has taught them some of his horticultural secrets, too, but equalling his skill with growing things is a challenge difficult to meet. His latest pride and joy is a fruit tree bearing nine different varieties. He threatens to make it ten varieties by year's end to match the 10 provinces of Canada.

Beginning with a young almond tree, Kostas grafted shoots of six different types of plums onto the main tree. Then he added the shoot from a peach tree

and a shoot from an apricot tree. All grafts are doing well and bearing fruit.

The secret of his success, as many a Canadian will testify, lies not so much with scientific skill as it does with his love for the flowers and trees of Bellapais.

More than one Canadian has already taken home a share of that fondness for Bellapais — the beautiful place with flowers from home.

NEW UNPA STATIONERY



The UN Postal Administration will issue this week a 13-cent airmail sheet, a 13-cent airmail postal card and a 6-cent definitive stamp to meet increased postage rates in the United States (UN Headquarters is located in New York). Stamps and first-day covers of the new definitive issue will be available at the Philatelic Office at UNFICYP Headquarters.

RADIO-ISOTOPES FIND GREATER PEACE USES

Many radio-isotope uses which can increase efficiency and lower costs in mining, mineral processing, metal manufacturing and other industrial operations were reported at a meeting of a Panel on Radio-isotope X-Ray Fluorescence Applications last week in Vienna.

The Panel was organized by the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) to evaluate developments in the field and advise on the best ways to promote their adoption, particularly by plants and factories in developing countries. It is composed of authorities from Australia, Austria, Canada, France, Japan, Poland, United Kingdom and United States.

The X-ray fluorescence technique makes use of the fact each element has a characteristic radiation which can be excited and subsequently isolated and measured to determine the kind and amount of the element present in, say, the sample alloy or ore. The exciting radiation can be provided conveniently and, in many cases, more cheaply by radio-isotopes than by the bulky conventional electronically-generated X-ray units.

As part of its technical assist-

ance programme, the IAEA has provided equipment for radio-isotope X-ray fluorescence work to several countries, including Guatemala, India, the Philippines and Yugoslavia.

NOBEL PRIZE WINNERS SURVEY PHYSICS FUTURE

Ten Nobel Prize winners will be among about 300 leading scientists from all parts of the world who will take part in a symposium lasting three weeks in Trieste, from 7 to 28 June. During this period a review, the first undertaken for many years, will be made of the whole spectrum of contemporary physics and the aspects to be discussed range from the basic structure of life and matter, including nuclear and plasma physics, to the origins and nature of the universe and galaxies.

This gathering of specialists in many scientific disciplines has been arranged by the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) through its Trieste Centre for Theoretical Physics.

When the symposium opens on 7 June, the first subjects discussed will be related to the secrets of life itself — chemical bonds, nucleic acids and the structure of proteins. The following week will be devoted to aspects of the theory of matter, quantum aspects of the theory of condensed matter, elementary particle phys-

(Continued from p. 1) tions that it was making a further voluntary contribution in the amount of \$80,000 towards meeting the costs incurred by UNFICYP during the period of December 1967 — June 1968.

The Government of Jamaica informed the Secretary-General, through a note dated 21 May, that it had approved a voluntary contribution of \$2,400 to help meet the operation costs of the UN Force in Cyprus.

INTERNATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS YEAR

22-Day Conference Yields "Teheran Proclamation"

An appeal for redoubled efforts to guarantee for all human beings a life of freedom and dignity was made in a "Proclamation of Teheran", a major instrument approved by the International Conference on Human Rights which ended on 13 May in Teheran, Iran.

During the 22-day session, the Conference approved guide lines for future international action with respect to a wide range of human rights.

Princess Ashraf Pahlavi of Iran, President of the Conference, in a closing statement, said that the Teheran Proclamation had the value of a sermon. It reflected, she said, "our unanimous will to redouble our efforts to achieve the complete and general realization of human rights, to eliminate, once and for all, the scourges of illiteracy, racism, violence, hunger and disease".

In the 26 resolutions which the Conference adopted, in addition to the Proclamation, it approved a wide-ranging programme of measures to promote women's rights in the modern world.

It condemned racial discrimination in general as a gross violation of human rights, and approved measures for its eradication, wherever it existed. In parti-

cials and specialized topics related to those subjects.

During the week beginning 17 June, three days will be taken up with low-energy, high-energy and particle physics, followed by two days on astrophysics, and on the Saturday specialized problems arising will be discussed.

The final week, beginning 24 June, will include a panel on plasma physics, with leading scientists from the main world centres, and the final days to general relativity and cosmology, with time allowed for other discussions, consideration of open problems and forecasts for the future.

cular, the Conference condemned apartheid, colonialism, nazism and racism and called for renewed action to eliminate them. South Africa and Portugal were condemned for their policies in Africa, and recommendations were made to the General Assembly and the Security Council for action against the two countries, including sanctions.

The Conference inscribed on its agenda a new item, entitled "Respect for and implementation of human rights in occupied territories". In a resolution on this item, it expressed "grave concern" about human rights violations in the Arab territories occupied by Israel as a result of the hostilities in June 1967, and requested the appointment, by the General Assembly, of a special committee to investigate these violations.


Guidelines for action were also approved concerning the humanitarian aspects of armed conflicts; human rights problems arising from modern scientific and technological developments; detention of persons for long periods, without being charged; promotion of economic and social rights; economic and social development; illiteracy; education of youth in the spirit of human rights; implementation of the rights of the child; human rights aspects of family planning; and legal aid systems for the protection of human rights.

Finally, the Conference approved a programme for furthering publicity on the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and it urged consideration of the possibility of designating 1969 as International Year for Action to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination.
