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## U THANT URGES INCREASED AID FOR ARAB VICTIMS

**I**N A REPORT ISSUED LAST WEEK ON REFUGEES AND OTHERS HARD HIT BY THE MIDDLE EAST CONFLICT, the Secretary-General urged that the humanitarian problem be, as far as possible, divorced from political and military issues so as to facilitate effective aid.

U Thant's report was based on information gathered by Special Representative, Ambassador Nils-Goran Gussing of Denmark, whose rough estimate was that about 350,000 Arabs had fled from areas taken over by Israel during the June hostilities. The report urged increased efforts to help those affected by the war.


### GENERAL DEBATE

## VIETNAM, MIDDLE EAST, DISARMAMENT, ISSUES OF MAIN CONCERN AT ASSEMBLY

The UN General Assembly's general debate was in full swing at UN Headquarters in New York where more than 50 nations have been heard so far touch on issues such as Viet-Nam, the Middle East, colonialism and racism in southern Africa, and the poverty that afflicts more than half of mankind.

Following are brief excerpts from statements made by some of the countries that have participated in the debate which began on 21 September.

One of the first speakers, the United States urged North Vietnam to indicate if she would be ready for peace negotiations under conditions fair to both sides if US stopped bombing her territory. Reaffirming that the US wanted a political settlement of the Vietnamese war. Amhassa-

dor Arthur Goldberg noted some governments and individuals, including the Secretary-General, had expressed their conviction that a halt of air raids would bring Hanoi to the negotiating table. However, he declared, no such assurances had been received by the US from Hanoi, despite efforts to elicit them.

On the Middle East, the US delegate hoped that both sides would show a will for peace, and said that the solution must be based on the recognition of the right of all States in the area to exist and the abandonment of all claims to belligerency, coupled with the withdrawal of Israeli troops from the occupied Arab territory.

On disarmament, the US delegate hailed the recent Soviet U.S. agreement on the draft treaty to prevent the spread of

nuclear weapons, and said that he was hopeful that one gap — inspection clause — would be filled in time for action by this Assembly.

The Soviet Union formally proposed an international ban on the use of atomic weapons and fresh United Nations efforts to define international aggression. Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko also charged that US aggression in Viet-Nam was a most serious threat to international peace today.

Mr. Gromyko said that last January the Democratic Republic of Vietnam had made a statement about its readiness for negotiations after a halt by the US of air raids and other aggressive acts against her. United States, Mr. Gromyko said, had replied with bombings and troops build up. The US state-

## Canadian Defence Minister Arrives To Visit CANCON

**T**HE Honourable Leo Cadieux, Minister of National Defence of Canada, arrived in Cyprus on Monday for a three-day visit primarily to see the Canadian soldiers serving with the United Nations Peace-Keeping Force here.

Mr. Cadieux spent most of Tuesday and part of Wednesday with the Canadian troops in Kyrenia, visiting a number of observation posts and other installations in the area.

On Tuesday morning, he met with Dr B.F. Osorio-Tafall, the Secretary-General's Special Representative in Cyprus, and the Force Commander, Lt Gen A.E. Martola, as well as with senior officers at UNFICYP Headquarters.

In a brief statement to the press on arrival, Mr Cadieux said that he will be returning to Canada today "and I am sure that I will be able to bring to Canada the story of our troops here being satisfied that they are accomplishing a worthwhile mission".

## EAST-WEST MEET AT DINNER HOSTED BY U THANT

**U** Thant, UN Secretary-General, was host at a dinner at United Nations Headquarters in New York for the Foreign Ministers of France, Great Britain, the Soviet Union and the United States.

A UN spokesman said the atmosphere had been informal, frank and friendly. The main topics raised, he said, were the Middle East, Cyprus and the Secretary-General's suggestion, made in his annual report to the Assembly, that periodic meetings of the Security Council should be held at Foreign Minister level. He added that there had been no specific discussion of the war in Viet-Nam.

The spokesman further explained that the talks had been exploratory and no formal deci-





## THE HAPPY WANDERER









ment, he said, attached ultimatum-like demands to a halt in air attacks. Peace in Viet-Nam he declared, could be brought about only by the withdrawal of aggressors.

British Foreign Secretary George Brown urged a ceasefire in Viet-Nam and negotiations for a political solution which would receive international confirmation. He said there was no reason a settlement could not be reached on the basis of the 1954 Geneva agreements, and that it was tragic that North Viet-Nam had declined to grasp one of the many opportunities to negotiate which remained open.

On the Middle East, Mr. Brown said Israel must withdraw from occupied areas but that, equally, the Arab nations must recognize her right to exist. Stating that a settlement could come about only through the United Nations, Mr. Brown endorsed the Secretary-General's proposal for a special representative to deal with the Middle East.

Surveying the African scene, the British Foreign Secretary said his Government remained determined to bring about majority rule in Rhodesia. He acknowledged it was difficult to measure how effective economic sanctions against the rebel white minority regime had been, but reaffirmed that Britain was against the use of force. Furthermore, he declared, Britain could not now contemplate an economic war with South Africa about Rhodesia or other problems of the southern part of Africa.

French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville told the Assembly no real settlement of any major conflict, and in particular that in the Middle East, would be possible without agreement among the major powers. And the most formidable obstacle to any entente among them, he said, was the war racing in Viet-Nam.

Mr. Couve de Murville said only the decisive initiative on the part of the Great Power which had directly involved itself in Viet-Nam — the United States — could create conditions necessary for a negotiated settlement. That initiative, he suggested, should be the "unconditional suspension, for an unlimited time, of the bombing which is ravaging North Viet-Nam."

On the Middle East, Mr. Couve de Murville said the obvious preliminary toward a peaceful settlement must be the evacuation of the conquered territories.

Foreign Minister Abba Eban of Israel told the Assembly that his Government was ready to replace the Middle East cease-fire by a negotiated peace based on viable and equitable proposals, and that a call for such negotiations would be

the most constructive course the Assembly could take.

Declaring there was no other valid choice, Mr. Eban said Israel could not take the "irrational course" of returning to the 4 June situation in which she faced annihilation by the Arab States determined to destroy her. He maintained a Middle Eastern peace must spring up from within the region, and no external declarations or guarantees, and no recommendations by international bodies could replace the sovereign responsibilities of the governments concerned.

The United Arab Republic reaffirmed that unconditional withdrawal of Israeli troops from Arab areas occupied during the June war must precede any attempt at a Middle East settlement, and that this was not negotiable. Foreign Minister Mahmoud Riad said Israel's call for direct negotiations was an attempt to legitimize territorial annexation as well as a violation to past commitments. He said to allow withdrawal of aggressor forces to be subjected to bargaining would negate the principle of territorial integrity.

Canada told the Assembly that a halt of US bombing of North Viet-Nam was a matter of first priority to get peace talks started, but that reciprocal concessions were needed to bring the war to an end.

Mr. Paul Martin, Canadian Secretary of State for External Affairs, said that Canada, a member of the International Control Commission, was ready to help bring about talks.

On the Middle East, Mr. Martin said Israeli withdrawal from occupied areas must be linked with a general settlement which would include an end to claims of belligerency.

Denmark's Prime Minister, Jens Otto Krag emphasized the need for the Middle East solution and supported the idea of sending a Special U.N. Representative to the area, as suggested by the Secretary-General.

For Sweden, Foreign Minister Torsten Nilsson said he shared the view of the Secretary-General that a halt of the bombing of North Vietnam could open the way for a peace settlement. He appealed to the United States "the most powerful party in the conflict", to take the initial step and start a military de-escalation process that could end the war.

Mr. Nilsson regretted that the Assembly, during its recent emergency session on the Middle East, was unable to outline the settlement providing for both peace and justice. He suggested that the United Nations set forth two principles that no rights resulted from military conquest and that every state had the right to exist in peace and security.

## ADEN EFFORTS WEIGHED AT U.N. HEADQUARTERS

Last week, the United Nations Special Mission on Aden, meeting at UN Headquarters in New York, issued the following statement:

"The United Nations Special Mission on Aden has taken note of the recent efforts undertaken by the leaders of the nationalist movements of the Territory to settle their differences and to establish co-operation between themselves. The Mission considers that the importance of attaining these objectives increases as the date set for the independence of the Territory approaches.

"The Mission accordingly expresses the fervent hope that the efforts under way will be crowned with success and thus facilitate the effective implementation of the relevant General Assembly resolutions in the interests of peace and unity in the Territory.

"The Mission is currently completing its report. However, if the situation demands, the Mission will be willing and ready to continue its assistance in bringing about the necessary understanding among the parties concerned".

## U THANT SENDS GREETINGS TO POPE PAUL

ON the occasion of Pope Paul VI's seventieth birthday, UN Secretary-General, U Thant, sent the following cable of greeting: "On the happy occasion of your seventieth birthday, I offer Your Holiness my warmest personal good wishes for your long life and good health. I also wish you many years of devoted service to the cause of peace and progress of humanity. With profound respect".

### COL. SIILASVUO JOINS UNTSO

FROM THE 15th OCTOBER 1967, COL ENSIO SIILASVUO OF THE GENERAL HEADQUARTERS STAFF OF THE FINNISH ARMY will assume the appointment of DCOS of the United Nations Truce Supervisory Organisation.

Col Siilasvuo has served on three previous occasions with the U.N. Forces. In 1957 he was Finnish Company Commander in Suez and in 1958 he was on the Staff of the HQ of UN Observer Group in Lebanon. In 1964-65 he was CO of Finnish Contingent in Cyprus.
