


## BON VOYAGE TO CAO


It seems incredible that our CAO, Bob Hausner, has decided to retire after nearly 25 years with the United Nations.



Sergeant Lace and Sergeant Earley are currently serving their fourth term with UNFICYP. Both have also had service in the Congo.


At home "The Fearless Heavies" exercise as part of their parent Regiment. On the Glen of Imaal Artillery range

Captain P. Walshe is troop Commander, with Captain P. McMenamin as second-in-command. The Troop Sergeant is Sergeant J. Carolan.








## ENSIAPUHARJOITUS

# 3 LI SUB AQUA ENTHUSIASTS



"Cyprus is an excellent place to learn to dive, with good clear water and hardly any currents. It is only a pity that there are so few shells to be found". So says Captain Laurence-King the energetic organiser of the 3rd Battalion Light Infantry Sub Aqua Club.

Certainly the idea seems to have caught on down at Polemidhia and as a relaxation from UN duties many soldiers have taken advantage of the opportunity to take up this increasingly popular sport.

The Sub Aqua Club members train three times a week at Akrotiri and every Sunday the members go "open water" diving. Once a month a weekend expedition is organised to some place of interest. So far the club has dived at Akrotiri, the Panhandle, Kormakiti, Cape Greco, Polis, Lara Point and the Akamas peninsular.

There are 36 members of the 3rd Battalion Light Infantry Sub Aqua Club at present and 19 of them are already members of the British Sub Aqua Club to which the regimental club is affiliated. ## A WORD OF WARNING

..... to all amateur Archeologists. All antiquities found in the Republic of Cyprus, or within its territorial waters, are the property of the Republic.

A licence to dig for antiquities or to search for them underwater is a legal requirement. Such licences are issued by the Department of Antiquities to suitably qualified persons only.

All antiquities discovered by accident, as reported last week in the "BLUE BERET", must be reported immediately to the nearest civilian authority.

The laws of the Republic provide for severe penalties for any person contravening these regulations.

## Belgium Contributes To UNFICYP

"Belgium intends to reserve its position in regard to any future participation in the financing of UNFICYP, if it should appear that the parties concerned display no will to reach a negotiated solution within a reasonable period of time."

This is a comment made in a letter to the Secretary-General, U Thant, in which the Permanent Representative of Belgium to the United Nations, Edouard Longerstaey, gives notice that the Belgian Government has decided to contribute a sum of 2,500,000 Belgian Francs (50,000 US Dollars) as a voluntary contribution towards the cost of UNFICYP for the period from 16th December, 1969 to 15th June, 1970.
