OP SADDLE




HEALTH HINTS FOR SUN WORSHIPPERS

As the temperature in Nicosia last week moved up to 38°C (100°F) we noticed some of the more recent arrivals, (and some of the old timers as well!) looking decidedly limp and jaded. We therefore asked the Chief Medical Officer for a few notes on the dangers of sunburn and prickly heat. These are published below.

Members of UNFICYP would be wise to remember that the fair Northern European skin is not well suited to long exposure to the Cyprus sun. The risk of sun burn depends on three factors, the sun's elevation, the absence of cloud or haze and the presence of wind. During the coming week the midday sun in Cyprus will be only 12½° from the vertical, the sky cloudless and the wind high, particularly on the beaches. Most of our homes lie north of the 50th parallel where the sun can never be less than 27½° from the vertical and the skies are often cloudy.

Midday in our summer equates roughly with the Cyprus June day before 8 a.m. and after approximately 4 p.m. Consequently, new arrivals should



avoid the period of intense sunlight by confining their sunbathing to the early morning and late afternoons, and even then, for short periods only to begin with. Gradually the periods may be lengthened and started near to noon.

Sun lotions do reduce the burning effect of the sun's rays, but also delay the tanning process, and are more useful for persons with sensitive skins who wish to avoid burns on exposed areas while taking exercise in the sun.


Sun worshippers should also remember that the long term effects of exposure are the destruction of the elastic tissue of the skin with the consequent production of wrinkling and also an increased risk of developing skin cancer".

CONTRIBUTIONS TO UNFICYP

Two more countries, the USA and Sweden, have announced their willingness to make further contributions towards the cost of UNFICYP.

In a letter dated 2nd June, the Permanent Representative of Sweden to the United Nations, states that his Government will pledge a further 180,000 US Dollars for the period which ended on 15th June 1971.

The United States Representative in his letter dated 9th June has informed the Secretary General that the United States is prepared to contribute up to 2,400,000 Dollars for the period of the current mandate ending on 15th December 1971. The final amount contributed will depend upon the amounts contributed by other countries, and the confirmation of the cost estimates. The United States has maintained that 40 per cent is its appropriate share of the costs to the UN of the Cyprus operations, and it therefore reserves the right to adjust the level of its pledges in accordance with this principle.






LONG SERVICE AWARD

On the 11th June, Staff Sergeant Barry Barnard, a helicopter pilot serving with UNFICYP Aviation Flight received the Long Service and Good Conduct Medal on completion of 18 years exemplary service. The present-

ation was made by Colonel D.E. Thornton CBE, ERD the Commander Britcon.

Staff Sergeant Barnard enlisted as a boy soldier at Arborfield in 1953. From the Apprentice School he was posted to 3 Trg Bn REME before joining the British Army of the Rhine, where he served for 8 months with 5 Armoured Workshops. Returning to UK he trained as an Aircraft Radio Technician prior to being transferred to the Army Air Corps. Following 3 years in the UK, Staff Sergeant Barnard was posted to 656 Sqn Army Air Corps in Malaya. In 1962, he went to Brunei with his Sqn, for a period of six months and was awarded the General Service Medal Borneo Clasp.

He first joined the United Nations Force in Cyprus in February 1964, but returned to the United Kingdom to attend a two year course for Artificers Aircraft, Electrical Instruments and Radio. On completion of the course in 1966 he was again posted to Borneo for a short tour. In December 1966 he returned to the UK where he qualified as a Helicopter Pilot. During May of this year he was posted to serve with the United Nations Force in Cyprus.


**BRITCON NEWS****SURMOUNTING ALL OBSTACLES**








Singing to the soft notes of the dual guitars, feeling the emotional commitment of uncommitted friendships and sharing in the sensitivity of the communion which conclu-



RESTORATION WORK

One of the big problems in Cyprus today is the care of many disused and abandoned old churches and mosques throughout the island, as many fine historical monuments and buildings of cultural value have become neglected owing to the abnormal situation prevailing in the island.

A UNESCO mission has been in Cyprus for 20 months undertaking a survey of the situation and the project is now entering its logical follow up, i.e. the restoration phase. Within UNFICYP, members of our own Economics sections, have been carrying out their own valuable contribution to the task of cleaning up important old buildings and making them secure against unauthorised

entry. Without specialists there is a limit to the amount of restoration that they can undertake, but there is no doubt that this work at local UN level is making a valuable contribution towards preserving the architectural treasures of Cyprus. It is hoped to increase our activities in this important sphere of operations, in the overall interests of normalisation.
