25th SESSION OF UN GENERAL ASSEMBLY OPENS IN NEW YORK

The twenty fifth session of the United Nations General Assembly opened on 15th September with calls for new patterns of international cooperation to deal with present day realities.

The representatives of 126 member states heard the newly elected President of the Session, Ambassador Edvard Hambro of Norway, say that the fragmentary international society of yesterday is obsolete, and that the world is in a state of transition looking towards an organized and integrated community of tomorrow in which each nation must learn to accommodate itself to the common interests of the world community.

Speaking on the eve of the opening of the General Assembly, Secretary-General U Thant expressed "cautious optimism" about world affairs, in contrast to the gloomy picture he had painted in the past few years.



NO SIGNIFICANT CHANGE IN CYPRUS

In the introduction to his annual report to the General Assembly, U Thant noted that "no significant change" has occurred in the Cyprus situation during the past year, and he went on to say that by and

large there has been peace in the island. He welcomed the continuation of inter-communal talks, but emphasised the danger that the passage of too much time may hamper rather than facilitate a settlement.

CANADIAN AID TO RED CROSS



Regimental Sergeant Major Bob Craig last week presented Mr J. Josephides, Vicepresident of the Cyprus Red Cross Association, with a cheque for £600.— Full story and pictures on inside page.

Whilst noting that the UN peace keeping force in the island has "steadfastly continued its efforts to maintain quiet", U Thant went on to emphasise, however, that a complete return to normality will only be possible when the different parties find a solution to basic issues. Pointing out that the elements for a political settlement in Cyprus do exist, U Thant called on the leaders of the Greek Cypriot and Turkish Cypriot Communities to make determined efforts to expedite the talks and to make such concessions as may be necessary to reach a just and lasting solution to their political problems.

BLOOD DONORS WANTED

During the first eight months of this year, UNFICYP soldiers have donated a total of 132 pints of blood. The majority of the donations have been made to blood banks at the Governments hospitals. Unfortunately, the greatest requirement is for Rhesus Negative blood which is relatively rare. Willing donors in these groups should register with their contingent medical officers.


SWEDCON – DANCON 0-0






BRITISH ARMY CYPRUS TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS



Here we see Stephen (Left) who comes from the Air Corps showing Anthony, who belongs to the Depot Supply and Transport, how his camera works.





Each Signals Officer presented his own detachment demonstrating how all the sets are inter-operable and how they can be worked through the re-broadcast and control stations at Troodos.


These monthly conventions have proved to be an excellent forum for fostering greater cooperation between all contingents.

CANADIANS AID CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

The patients and staff of the Kyrenia Red Cross Crippled Children's Hospital received a pleasant surprise last week when they were presented with a donation of £600 (\$1,500.00) by the First Battalion, the Royal Canadian Regiment of London, Ontario.

The cheque was presented by Regimental Sergeant Major Bob Craig, on behalf of the Battalion, to Mr. J. Josephides, vice-president of the Cyprus Red Cross Association.

Under the direction of RSM Craig, the company transport sergeants organized games, small raffles and donation cans to raise the money.

In addition to the money, Lieutenant Ron Moll presented Dr. Z. Hakki, vice-president of the Red Cross Association,

with two boxes of gifts donated by the Kinsmen's Club of East London, Ontario.

The Canadians have "adopted" the Crippled Children's Hospital as a special project since the United Nations Force arrived in Cyprus. Since 1966 Canadian soldiers based in Cyprus have donated £3,300 (\$8,250) to the hospital. In addition to financial aid the Contingents have from time to time made repairs and improvements to existing facilities, and provided some medical supplies as well as showing weekly films to the children.








